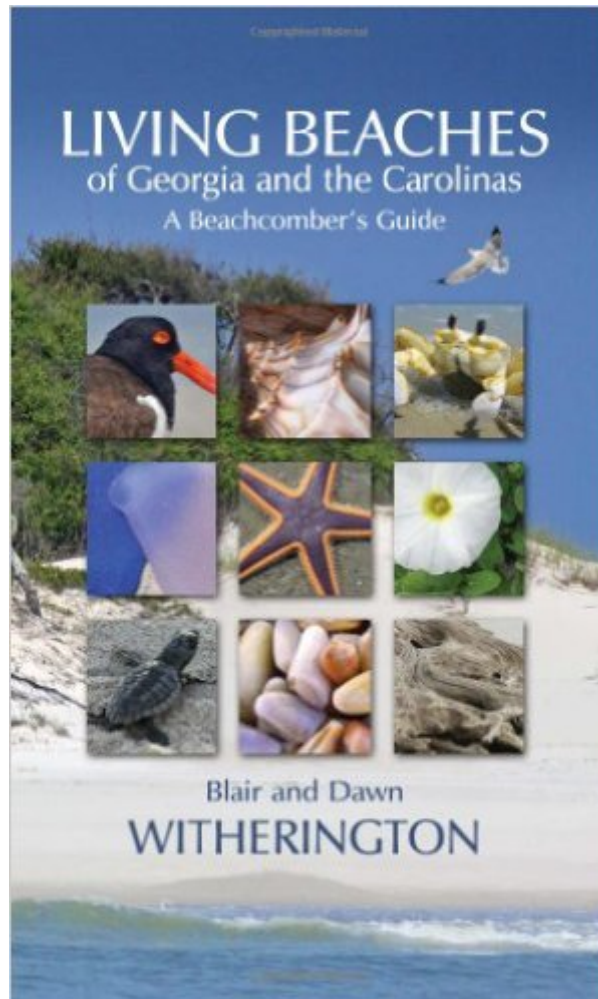

If you carry only one book on Coastal Georgia's plant and animal life, this can be it. Extremely comprehensive for identification and comparison, you will find chapters covering everything from what you can find in tide pools, or attached to pier pilings, or creepy crawling in the sand or tidal mud. Great color pictures help identify the large variety of shore and sea birds, mollusks, shells, plants, and strange things. The book opens with a large chapter describing in photos and text many things you never noticed about the beach and it's important features. Could only wish that it was spiral bound making it easier to use.

If you are looking for books about beaches, shells, wildlife, ocean inhabitants...well, let's just say, you can't find any better than Living Beaches by the Witheringtons! I have their Florida, Georgia and Carolinas versions and they are fantastic reads and the go-to books for anyone who loves beaches. I was looking for an easy to use guide for an upcoming trip to the Outer Banks. We homeschool our son and I wanted something that would pique his interest and be easy for me to navigate while I taught him. This book is wonderful! It is paperback, but has a thicker cover than most paperbacks. All of pages are thick and glossy. All pages in the book are actual color photographs of the specimens, not a black and white drawing. When I opened the box my first reaction was "Wow, these are really nice quality and definitely worth the money." These aren't cheap flimsy books that will fall apart in 6 months. I bought this book and "Seashells of Georgia and the Carolinas" by the same authors. The seashell section of this book was so complete that I really didn't need to buy the separate title, but anyhow, we love seashells and it will get some good use. The layout is really nice too. Each section of the book names the family of creatures, names its relatives, explains identifying

features, names the different types, explains their habitat, and features a "Did You Know" snippet at the bottom of each page. As a matter of fact, I enjoyed looking at it so much that I started reading it the night I got it. If you are looking for an easy, concise, well written, well-documented book with nice color photos that explains beach life in an easy to understand manner this is the book for you. Now grant it, I haven't had a formal biology class in years, and there were some terms used that I wasn't familiar with, but it's so well written that you can pretty much figure out what the author is saying. The only thing that would really make this book out of this world, is if it were ring bound so I can flip the pages over. This is an excellent guide to take down to the beach!
